

Air Rifle Activity Instructions and Risk Assessment for Beavan Challenge at Tawd Vale

The primary Range Officer for Air Rifles is Andy Back of 5th Heswall Scout Group.

Geoff Back and Jason Barrowclough (also of 5th Heswall Scout Group) also hold scouting air rifle permits and may act as Range Officer as appropriate.

Preparation and Equipment: All participants need a parental permission to shoot. No form, no shooting. The form will detail any health conditions which could affect the activity.

Briefing: A safety brief will be given to groups at the beginning of the air rifle session, which will be conducted in accordance with the guidance set out by the National Smallbore Rifle Association, and cover the following points:

• Introduction

- Who's shot before.
- o Discipline must obey the session leader (the range officer)
- o Range Layout.
- \circ What to expect
- o Objective
- Safety
 - Appropriate clothing: loose enough for free movement. No snagging / flapping bits that may become entangled, remove lanyards or hanging jewellery etc. from round neck, tie back long hair to prevent entanglement.
 - Never point a gun at anyone.
 - Always point the gun downrange.
 - Always treat the gun as loaded.
 - o Range rules.
 - On no account should any of the group approach the Archery or Axe throwing ranges which are nearby.
- Equipment
 - \circ Gun



- Pellets made of lead and therefore associated health precautions (wash hands)
- Targets
- \circ Safety Glasses to be worn at ALL times when on range

• Demonstration

- $\circ \quad \text{Safe Loading} \quad$
- Basic Technique
- Aim the gun empty first
- Talk scouts through loading and fire one shot

• Shooting

- Shoot leaning on the bench
- Eye dominance
- o Sights
- o Trigger control
- \circ Breathing
- Standing position

Weather: As the shooting line is covered air rifle shooting can happen in most weather conditions. In extremes, if the Session Leader believes it is unsafe to continue the session it will be abandoned and the group returned to the start in a safe manner.

Conduct of Session

The nominated Range Officer will ensure range is safe and equipment is collected and ready.

The nominated Range Officer will give the briefing (as set out in the sections above).

The nominated Range Officer will deliver the session in accordance with the guidelines set out by the NSRA.

At the end of the session the Range Officer and his deputies will collect all equipment and lock it away until required for the next session.
